Register Now This 5day course 1 day indoor and 4 days on snow includes topics such as slalom and giant slalom basics for U14 and U16 athletes. Topics in this 5day course 2 days indoor and 3 days on snow include slalom and giant slalom training and sequencing, course setting, analyzing performance, support for athletes at a race and practice coaching sessions. Other concepts covered on the course include principles of biomechanics, decision making tools and use of video analysis. There is general focus is on core coaching competencies valuing, leading, interacting with people, problem solving and critical thinking. The number of available courses is limited as demand is small. The targeted coach will undergo a detailed gap analysis aimed to identify competencies needing improvement or development, necessary to deliver on athlete needs in this context. 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The ACACSC coach education program links directly with the ACA LTAD stages of growth and skill development. At each of the different coaching levels, coaches acquire the knowledge and skills necessary to meet the growth and skill development needs of the skier. Our coach certification program is part of the Coaching Association of Canada's National Coaching Certification Program NCCP. As a partner of the Coaching Association of Canada, Canadian ski coaches must meet or exceed minimum competency requirements to be recognized as trained or certified. To be eligible to coach with any Alpine Canada club, coaches are required to be a licensed ACACSC member in good standing. To view the ACACSC licensing policy visit www.canskicoach.org. The certified advanced coach knows how to lead a program, athletes and coaches, within their level of certification. Coaches will choose their path depending on the level of skiers they are coaching, employer requirements or personal interest. This program is meant to pair up a prospective coach with a mentor coach during the initial stages of learning how to be a coach while supporting young developing ski racers. They must complete the EL course within this time period to coach the following year. Once verified we can manually input them into our database as a temporary member since they still need to be licensed members in good standing with ACACSC to work with developing ski racers. Entry level coaches are focused on developing fundamental ski technique through use of the Snow Stars program. Coaches safely apply fundamental teaching and learning principles during training and competitions to promote the consolidation of a skiers technique and application of

tactics in giant slalom and slalom. Development Level certified coaches have the knowledge and expertise to safely guide skiers when learning speed and ski cross terrain management skills. Ski racers at these stages are following the competitive pathway to compete at the highest level of ski racing. This includes elements of the able-bodied EL and DL pathways and a Para specific module compatible for both EL Para and DL Para programs. Originally created in 2001, the success of this program is built on its role as an accessible education and planning guide for Canadian ski coaches and families. For this reason, the program is aimed at young skiers from the Gliding Start, Skier Essentials and to the Learn to Train stages. The Snow Stars program is meant to provide ski clubs and coaches guidance through the foundational years where the development of proper skiing skill execution on demand is critical to future success. Without the involvement of daily physical activity through participation in complementary sports and free play year-round, a significant physical literacy development opportunity is lost resulting in the inability of the young skier to reach their full potential. From the moment of registration to their final graduation from the program, you can follow along with your skiers achievements. Combining coaching creativity with the resources presented here in the ACA LTAD you can develop a skiers fundamental movement and skiing skills using the Snow Stars programming. Coaches should use a variety of coaching methods to accommodate the various learning styles of the children. A coach will guide their skiers through a skill progression to make skiing skills easier to acquire. Coaches also act observers who provide timely questions and feedback to their skiers to match their learning style. Use the Snow Stars progressions to help you plan your season and to identify the skills you want to develop for the current season. Without a plan, it will be difficult to measure and manage a progression to ensure you are meeting or exceeding your goals.

Skill evaluation events are planned well ahead of time; young skiers should be evaluated two to three times per year. Working together with another nearby club helps to promote a festival environment. The following terms explain the stages of skill development that a young skier will proceed through when learning new skills. This progression assists coaches in determining where their skiers are on the skill development continuum. Only one scorecard per skier per season is needed to record the scores of an early, mid and end of season evaluation. Young skiers love knowing their results immediately. If snow conditions and weather are going to affect results negatively, please select another day. Are they drills that they have done before. If yes, this will help to reduce the stress level of the skier. From the Level 1, controlled skier to the level 5 versatile skier, you will be able to see if the skier is confidently carving linked turns with speed and consistency. Always look for fluid movements and a relaxed attitude on the skis. Before starting down this path we encourage skiers to become familiar with the related documents here, including The courses are set by the Canadian Ski Coaches canskicoach.org using Alpine Ontario Coach Facilitators to run the courses. Days 23 are held on snow and focus on skiing demonstration of short turns, long turns and entry level skills lift tickets are required at an additional cost. Successful candidates will be accredited as an Alpine ski coach trained status and National Coaching Certification Program member. This 20minute Interactive Module introduces concepts that will be used throughout the Level 1 Decision Making for Instructors, The Gliding Experience beginner progression, Technical Reference, and responsible teaching. Candidates are responsible for this information as part of the Course curriculum. Membership Benefits are available to you provided your membership fees are fully paid, making you an active Member. This Program enables Ski Instructors to improve their decision making and situational teaching skills, to acquire a better understanding of CSIA technique and methodology, our Technical Reference, and the role of ski teaching within the ski industry.

It combines practical ski teaching methods for intermediate parallel skiers, technical understanding and development, and improvement of guest service skills. They will also receive suggestions and strategies for longterm development. The successful Candidate is certified to teach skiers up to intermediate parallel skill level. Candidates who have already achieved the Level 4 Partial Teaching Certification are granted an equivalency on this component. These associations are in turn governed by the ISIA International Ski Instructors Association, which sets the global standards for all the member organisations. All have very high standards for the final level, but allow you to begin working while training for these higher levels. Most countries will feel that their system and instructors are the best, but the reality is they are very similar with different terminologies. While there may be subtle differences in technique and teaching methods, most systems share a similar structure and international recognition, and carry more clout in their own country than others. The tiered systems CSIA, BASI, NZSIA are relatively easy to get started in and then ramp up as you progress through the levels, while a few others e.g. ENSA have very demanding entrance requirements. Usually level 1 is only recognised in the country of the awarding body. You'll be able to work almost anywhere in the world, including France if you have passed the Euro Test. So whether you qualify with the CSIA, BASI or NZSIA, you'll be able to work throughout the globe, from Canada and Europe to New Zealand and Japan. BASI generally has better recognition in Europe and CSIA is preferred in North America. Without going directly through the challenging French system, BASI offer the clearest pathway, although it is possible with other systems as well. For example, if you have your CSIA level 1, you will be able to work in Canada but nowhere else.

This is what most employers expect, regardless of the system, and so achieving this should be your goal if you want to work worldwide. At level 2, the major omission to where you can work is France. To work here, you must have additional qualifications as mentioned above. As a fully certified instructor in any system, you'll most likely be able to work anywhere in the world with few, if any, exceptions. You can transfer to another system should your ambitions change or you decide your career would benefit from a switch to another qualification. For example, if you have your CSIA level 2 and want to transfer to BASI, you'll need to sit the BASI level 2 exam. Most instructor systems offer a similar career path, but some may be better suited to certain goals than others. When weighing up these options, consider the following: If you know where you want to work in future seasons, do that country's qualification or one that is very well recognised in the region. CSIA is generally a better option for North America, while BASI is better recognised in Europe. If you're not sure where you want to work. For example, if you know you want to train in Canada, then do their qualification. If you want to work in France, then BASI is generally the better route. This will require many years of training to reach the top level. If you've got any questions, get in touch with our course advisors who'll be happy to run through things.
