Negative question tags are usually contracted: It's warm today, isn't it (not 'is it not') Usually if the main clause is negative, and if the main clause is negative, it's positive. If the main verb in the sentence is have (not an auxiliary verb), it is more common to use do in the tag. For example, "You're coming to the party, aren't you?" with a rising tone at the end signals that the speaker isn't sure and is asking for confirmation. Ultimately, they enhance communication by encouraging participation, confirming understanding, and ensuring mutual agreement between speakers and listeners. If you're unsure, you can ask, "You've been to Paris, haven't you?" This allows you to confirm facts and keep the conversation flowing.
