For older adults, perhaps nothing is more frightening than the prospect of spending their last years in a nursing home. More than 1 out of 2 50-year-old adults and more said they would rather die than live in a long-term care facility, according to a recent survey of the Nationwide Retirement Institute. The organization took an online survey of 1,462 people in that age group from 25 March to 10 April. Loneliness, loss of independence and being without family were some of the main drivers behind their admission to nursing homes, Nationwide found. Your birthday present might be a surprise fee Also, almost 70% of participants also said that one of their best retirement fears is out of control health care costs, including nursing expenses. They have a good reason to worry. A healthy 65-year-old couple who retires this year can expect to spend \$285,000 on retirement health care costs, including Medicare, copays and prescription drugs, according to Fidelity Investments data. And this is before adding in the long-term service cost, which works up to \$102,200 each year for a private room in a care facility, according to Genworth Financial. "An important misunderstanding is to believe that you have a plan to cover long-term care expenses and not actually start it," said Kristi Rodriguez, vice president of the thinking leadership for Nationwide Financial. More than 1 out of 3 of Nationwide survey participants said they did not discuss long-term insurance expenses with anyone. If no one speaks of it, there are misunderstandings in the management of such costs, Rodriguez said. "The biggest misunderstanding is that people think that long-term care costs will be covered by Medicare," he said. Original Medicare can pay some of the costs for up to 100 days in a qualified care facility for rehabilitation after a qualifying hospital stay. The program will not cover the cost of the service if you are infirm and require a long-term stay in a care facility or if you needAt home with eating, bathe and other daily life activities. "You will need more than 100 days of service if you take care of the older ones," Rodriguez said. There are different ways for pensioners to meet the needs of a nursing home, including the use of traditional long-term term care or buying a life insurance that covers some benefits for treatment. Regating without facing this problem, talk to your family and collaborate with a financial advisor to draft a strategy. Rodriguez of Nationwide has three questions to skip the discussion with spouses and relatives: 1. Where do you see your future? Pensioners can spend their first years on the road, but they tend to slow down as they get older. If you have this conversation with a spouse, think about the lessons you might have learned by looking at your parents or grandparents' age. What would you do differently? 2. Where do you want to be? This question helps people face the concept of where they want to age: do they see this happening at home? Are they expecting to take care of an assisted life facility? Three out of four people interviewed by Nationwide would prefer to receive home care.3. Who will help provide assistance? Be honest if you expect your children or spouses to provide assistance if you stay home. The caregivers who are still working could see their salaries and the savings of retirement take a hit. "There is also the indirect cost of family tension," Rodriguez said. "The families need to talk about it." "

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
