Enjoy the seasons in Madison County Let yourself be helped to plan your tour Download Madison County Visitor Guide «WINTERSET Gareggiare around Madison County to find all six decks covered in an afternoon is a delicious treasure hunt that I don't recommend. The first covered sign you will see when you approach Winterset from Interstate 35 points to the Holliwell Bridge in the south-east of the city. This structure, built in 1880, not only allows you to go back in time, but offers a wonderful view of the Middle River. (Diana Nollen/The Gazette) Leave Cedar Rapids long before during the day and indulge in about 2.5 hours to get there, so enjoy a much quieter day exploring the bridges. I felt like Van Helsing chasing the last vestiges of sunlight to get to the Imes bridge further south to St. Charles on September 21st. But I did it and finished with enough dark light to return around Des Moines and in the family territory of Interstate 80 before sunset. One day, I'll learn not to turn on the computer for a few minutes before I leave town. If you have a passenger, don't expect that person to drive you through all the picturesque rocky streets of the roller coasters that lead to the bridges. One of you will end up alone on the edge of a side street in half a day. And yes, the bridges look more or less, but the hunt is so pleasant and the reward is going through history pages, a 1992 bestseller book, the 1995 success film and, above all, a Tony 2014 winning musical staged so beautifully four years later by the Revival TheatreIn Cedar Rapids. (Trivia: The pre-Broadway 2013 race played Elena Shaddow as Francesca, the same actress who hypnotized the recent crowd of Brucemorchestra. And of course the novel was written by the late Robert James Waller, native of Iowa who He wrote: he wrote: book in 11 days during a leave of absence from his role as Dean of the University of North Iowa College of Business.) In addition to the bridges, Winterset is the birthplace of actor John Wayne and University of Iowa graduate and art teacher George Stout, leader of World War II "Monuments Men", charged with finding and recovering works stolen by the Nazis. Both men have been commemorated in feature films, and both will be honoured during this year's Covered Bridge Festival, held from 9am to 3pm. Saturday 9 October and Sunday 10 October 2021. Events are taking place throughout the city this weekend, but major venues include the downtown courthouse, the John Wayne Museum, the Madison County Historical Complex and the Madison County Fairgrounds. A parade winds through the city at 2:00 a.m. on Sunday, and guided bus tours of the school's covered deck are offered both days. If you decide to explore Winterset and Madison County at any other time, here are some highlights: Download the map in madisoncounty. com/map-to-bridges/ to get the layman of the land. Iowa Colorful Road Signs will also help you drive. If you use Exit 56 off I-35, Highway 92 will take you to Winterset. But before you get into town, you will see a sign to turn left for the Holliwell Bridge. This may be the first stop of the scavenger hunt. You will end up on a dirt road, and when it is not clear how you should go to the fork, turn left at Norwood Avenue and Holliwell Bridge Road. (It seems obvious, but it is not clearly marked.) Keep driving forever, second-guessing yourself and your map app, but in the end you'll find the bridge and plenty of awesome photo opportunities. It is located about 3.5 miles southeast of Winterset, and is a great introduction to these architectural treasures scattered around the county. Built in 1880, the Holliwell Bridge now takes pedestrians for a walk through worn-out axles; examine the crossed wooden inner straps and antique hardware: see names and initials scrawled on the walls â and add your own; and just immerse yourself in the beauty of the Middle River, which winds into the nearby Des Moines River To Carlisle. It is also the end point of the Middle River Water Trail, a 45-mile trail that begins at Middle River Forest County Park in Adair County. Signal from the bridge will explain the flora, fauna, fish and geological history of the area, and offer recreational tips for bottling, sailing and fishing the river. A metal marker documents the bridge's history, and you'll find that at 155 feet, the Holliwell Bridge â is the longest covered bridge, and the longest remaining wooden bridge in the state.â Other covered bridges in Madison County, typically named for their closest residents, are the Cut Bridge. 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
